A MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO KIM CHURCHES:

I'm proud of what we've accomplished together this year: We've advanced equal-pay laws, taught women everywhere to negotiate for higher salaries, and released critical research on the leadership gap in non-profits across the US. Please take a look at AAUW's [online magazine Outlook](#), which highlights our 2018 accomplishments and exciting plans for the future/, I hope you enjoy perusing the issue, which goes into greater depth on the important work AAUW is doing on behalf of women and girls. With so many successes behind us, and a gathering energy driving us forward, the outlook for 2019 is promising indeed.

2019 could be an even bigger year for championing equity, especially given the historic number of diverse female leaders who won Congressional seats and governorships in November. AAUW is working on many fronts to ensure economic security for women and their families. We're advancing laws to narrow the pay gap. We're teaming up with employers to ensure their practices align with the modern workforce. And we've expanded our [Work Smart program](#) to train 10 million women in salary negotiation skills.

AAUW staff have been working on the agenda for the 116th Congress. Our top priority is to make sure that bills ensuring economic security for women, like the Paycheck Fairness Act, are ready to go when Congress convenes in January. We're continuing to work on priority issues in the administration as well — don't miss our [article](#) explaining the likely effects of the proposed Title IX regulations and the importance of continuing to protect survivors of sexual harassment and assault. We also met with Kenneth Marcus, Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights at the U.S. Department of Education, to voice our concerns with the way the Department is enforcing civil rights laws for our nation's students. There is exciting potential in our priority areas in 2019, and we are also laying the groundwork for AAUW to lead the fight in defending our hard-won gains.

Our shelter families will be so surprised with the gifts. Currently we have 12 women and 9 children ranging in ages 1 month to 12 years old. Maholo for making their holiday merry and bright. Mahalo nui loa***

In their end of the year newsletter, Ms. Kaaihua notes that in the past year Women Helping Women provided emergency shelter to 250 women and children, helped 500 people of all ages to obtain restraining orders, received 1000 crisis calls to their hotline, and gave 30 presentations and training sessions to a combined audience of over 1200 people. They expect even greater demands for service next year. Every two years, AAUW members vote on revisions to our Public Policy Priorities. Now through January 11, 2019, you can comment on and indicate support for the changes recommended by the AAUW Public Policy Committee. **Be sure to take advantage of this opportunity to submit feedback on AAUW's 2019-2021 Public Policy Priorities!**

New Mission Statement: AAUW National has announced a new Strategic Plan. The Strategic Plan contains the new mission statement: "To advance gender equality for women and girls through research, education and advocacy". Although it is very similar to the previous mission statement, the new statement emphasizes gender equality as part of our mission.

Deeper In Debt: Right now about 44 million borrowers in the US hold about 1.4 trillion in outstanding student loans. Women hold nearly 2/3rds of this debt - nearly 900 billion as of mid- 2018. The AAUW Deeper In Debt Report examines the experiences of women and offers a broad overview of how student debt became a women's issue. It relies heavily on publicly available federal government survey data as well as published studies undertaken by academics and organizations researching this issue. 
Work Smart: AAUW Work Smart aims to train 10 million women in salary negotiation by 2022. Whether you are currently employed or want to be in a position to advise and assist other women, we suggest you take AAUW's Work Smart online program. Saturday, January 5, 2019 at noon. Marsha Palmer will lead a discussion of *The Japanese Lover* by Isabel Allende. Described as "A saga of a couple that keeps its affair secret for over half of a century," the novel carries us from 1939 to the present, As Poland falls under the shadow of the Nazis, Alma Belasco's parents send her to live with an aunt and uncle in San Francisco. There she meets Ichimei Fukuda, the quiet and gentle son of the family's Japanese gardener. A love affair begins to blossom until the two are pulled apart following the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. Decades later Irina Bazili, a care worker, meets Alma's grandson, Seth, as he visits at a San Francisco nursing home. Intrigued by a series of mysterious

gifts and letters sent to Alma, they eventually learn about Ichimei and a secret passion that has endured for nearly seventy years.

Dr. Gates has been the superintendent of Haleakalā National Park since March 2013. She graduated from Harvard College with a degree in Biology. She earned a Doctorate in Veterinary Medicine from Cornell University College of Veterinary Medicine, and a master's degree in Wildland Resource Management from the University of California at Berkeley. During her career in the National Park Service (NPS), Dr. Gates has worked as acting superintendent of Lake Roosevelt National Recreation Area in eastern Washington and has completed detail assignments with the NPS Office of Legislation and Congressional Affairs in Washington, D.C. and with the Office of Communications and Public Affairs at the NPS Pacific West Regional Office.
