AAUW NATIONAL NEWS

FROM THE VICE-PRESIDENT OF PUBLIC POLICY AND RESEARCH: Recently, I had the honor of attending an event honoring the 50th anniversary of Shirley Chisholm's historic election to the U.S. House of Representatives. Fifty years after Representative Chisholm became the first African American woman in Congress, she still serves as an icon and example for women who continue to diversify and change the conversation, not just in the halls of Congress, but everywhere. The event provided such a fitting moment of reflection after this past election. The midterm elections ushered in changes at all levels of government, but the dominant story of this election was the power of women. Women voters came out in droves to demand their voices be heard, and an unprecedented number of women from diverse backgrounds ran for office and won. Beating the former record of 112 women in both chambers of the current Congress, at least 125 women will serve in the 116th Congress — 102 in the House and 23 in the Senate. Additionally, at least nine women will lead their states as governors. This was a record-breaking election for the representation of women, and in particular, women of color.

In addition to the notable firsts, this election also conveyed a larger message — gender equity is a winning issue. Members of Congress are coming to Washington with a charge from voters to stop the erosion of rights we've seen in the past two years. We are excited to work with the 116th Congress to strengthen equal pay laws, make workplaces and schools safer for women and girls, and help all families succeed. And we will continue to fight the rollbacks of these protections coming from the administration — read on to learn more about the attack on Title IX and how AAUW is taking action. It's time to hold all our elected officials accountable to ensure they are working to advance gender equity for all women and girls. Onward! Deborah J. Vagins

THE NEWS FROM THE STATE HOUSES IS GOOD AS WELL: At the state level, women ran and women won in record numbers. Nine will lead their states as governors and at least 2,019 women will serve in their state legislative chambers. Women will comprise 27.3 percent of state legislatures — a substantial increase

from the current level of 25.4 percent. Nevada may reach parity between men and women in their state legislature. Colorado is also close to reaching this benchmark, which no state legislature has ever managed to accomplish.

The other trend we saw at the state level was the rise of single-party control and consolidation of statehouses. After the midterm elections, only one state — Minnesota — will have legislative chambers that are controlled by different parties. And at least 36 states will have government trifectas, with the same party controlling both chambers and the governor's mansion. This polarization means that it will be easier to advance legislation at the state level, but AAUW will have to continue our work to ensure that those policies are advantageous to women. In addition to these electoral milestones, this election also conveyed a larger message — gender equity is a winning issue. Candidates who discussed issues central to the well-being of working families often won. Now it's time to hold all our elected officials accountable to ensure they are working to advance gender equity for all women and girls. We look forward to working together and are excited about what's to come.

That's AAUW's mission, and education has been central to our work since we were founded in 1881. That's why <u>Title IX</u> is such a big part of our history — it was the first comprehensive federal law to prohibit sex discrimination in education and opened classroom doors for women and girls. Since Title IX's implementation, schools have made huge strides in providing equal access to education. Keeping schools free from sex discrimination is key to opportunity. Without the protections of Title IX, schools can discriminate, and women students are less likely to succeed. Title IX is central to AAUW's mission — and we need your help to make sure it continues to protect women and girls from discrimination in education. The Department of Education announced a plan to make sweeping changes to Title IX's regulations, which would have significant implications for students' civil rights and for federal enforcement of the law. Title IX protects all students from discrimination — students of all genders, from kindergarten through college. These proposed changes would weaken Title IX's protections by narrowing the definition of sexual harassment to allow schools to exclude much of the abuse students experience, limiting when schools will respond, and putting in place processes that make it harder for students to come forward when they experience sexual harassment or assault. Simply put, these changes will make schools less safe for students. With progress under threat, we all must make our voices heard. Over the next 60 days, we have an opportunity to weigh in with the Department of Education on their proposed changes. Now is the time to stand up against any rollbacks to students' Title IX rights. This scholarship will help me pay for my living expenses and prevent me from falling further into student load debt. It is my dream to become a nurse and serve my community, which has helped shape who I am today. 
