Honor Harriet Tubman With \$20 Bill Stamp



One way to celebrate the 100th anniversary of women gaining the right to vote in 2020 is to honor Harriet Tubman by stamping her image on a \$20 bill! As most people know, Harriet Tubman was a former slave

turned abolitionist who led 70 slaves to their freedom via the Underground Railroad. She also helped over 700 slaves gain freedom during the Civil War. She served as an armed scout and spy for the North during the Civil War (she was in fact the first woman to lead an armed expedition in any U.S. war). After the Civil War, Tubman became a pioneer for women's right to vote.

The former U.S. Secretary of the Treasury, Jack Lew, announced plans on April 20, 2016 that a portrait of Tubman would be placed on a new \$20 bill. However, the current Secretary of the Treasury Steven Mnuchin announced that the release would be delayed until 2028 due to security and anti-counterfeiting measures. Fortunately, you can put Tubman's image on the \$20 now by purchasing a stamp bearing her likeness and stamping it over the face of Andrew Jackson. It doesn't violate Treasury rules to do this.

Some Local History on Women's Voting Rights

The Nineteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution became law in August 1920.

At the time, Hawaii was a U.S. Territory, not a state, but since 1900 Hawaiians were considered to be U.S. citizens of the Hawaiian Territory.

There is a record of the first woman in Hawaii who registered to vote after ratification of the 19th Amendment. This honor falls upon Johanna Niau Wilcox. Wilcox was born in Honolulu and lived from 1898 to 1974. She attended Kamehameha School for Girls, and graduated from Punahou School in 1917. She then joined the US Naval Reserve, and worked as a government employee for 43 years in various county departments.

Her experiences were recorded in The Watamull Foundation Oral History Project in August 1971.

Wilcox said that she registered to vote at 12:15 a.m. on August 30, 1920. She describes her voter registration as "a little plot" that started around midnight. She was a clerk in the county building department. The then-clerk of Honolulu County, David Kalauokalani, wanted to help her to be the first woman to register. She remembered that "...the night before women were supposed to vote—or register.....they drove me down to the county [building] and I registered, and then they brought me home....It was lots of fun, you know. Quite exciting..."
