Maui Branch Joins Chocolate Fundraiser

Calling all chocolate lovers and those whose friends and family love chocolates! We are excited to announce that the Maui AAUW Chapter is partnering with Maui Ku'ia Estate Chocolate, Inc. (MKEC), Maui's first farm-to-bar chocolate factory and the largest chocolate factory in

Hawai'i. The program, Chocolate Laulima, meaning "many hands working together", will give back 40% of all sales we generate to help fund our scholarship program.

The program offers several options:a 25-piece and 50-piece bag with either a 65% Dark Chocolate or 60% Dark Milk Chocolate option,



or a new gift box offering of a 27-piece assortment (9 Maui mango, 9 Guava, and 9 Calamansi) in 60% cacao Dark Milk Chocolate. Shipping is only \$10 for orders of \$50 - \$100, with MKEC paying for shipping on orders over \$100.


President's Report (continued)



The book for March is *The Lost Art of Mixing: The School of Essential Ingredients*, by Erica Bauermeister.

Lillian and her restaurant have a way of drawing people together. There's Al, the accountant who finds meaning in numbers; Chloe, a budding chef who hasn't learned to trust after heartbreak; Finnegan, quiet and steady as a tree, who can disappear into the background despite his massive height; Louise, Al's wife, whose anger simmers just below the boiling point; and Isabelle, whose memories are slowly slipping from her grasp. And there's Lillian herself, whose life has taken a turn she didn't expect...Their lives collide and mix with those around them, creating a family that is chosen, not given. A beautifully imagined novel about the ties that bind—and links that break—*The Lost Art of Mixing* is a captivating meditation on the power of love, food, and companionship.



The book for April is *The Three-Year Swim Club: The Untold Story of Maui's Sugar Ditch Kids and Their Quest For Olympic Glory,* by Julie Checkoway.

This is the tale of impoverished sugar plantation children on Maui who were challenged by an elementary teacher to swim literally and figuratively against the current of their circumstances and to become Olympic champions.

2021's **Chinese New Year of the Ox** is on Friday, February 12. Also called Spring Festival and Lunar New Year, celebrations can last up to 16 days. This year, it ends on February 26 with the Lantern Festival. Ordinarily, there would be parades with lion dances, cultural performances, and exhibits at Maui's shopping malls and Lahaina's Wo Hing Temple, now unlikely with pandemic restrictions. But it's still possible to celebrate with special foods, such as *yi mein*, long life noodles, *jai*, vegetarian monk's food, and *gau*, a sweet,


