The mother (about 30 to 35 feet long) stood on her head in about 85 feet of water with her tail fin extended above the water while her offspring sprung into action. The weather was iffy right up until sailing, but we had a glorious day at sea! Much mahalo to our incredible Whale Watch Fundraising team lead by Terry Rosenstock and ably supported by Maureen Van Denburgh, Virginia Shaw, Jean Keating and Pat Gotschalk as well as our other board members and members who bought tickets, sold tickets, advertised the event, secured door prizes and donations, contributed pupus, and added to the fun of our fabulous excursion. We paid the boat charter cost and raised all money needed for our goal of three scholarships at \$2,000 each! That is an all-time high!

March is National Women's History Month, and 2020 is marking the 100th anniversary of Women's Suffrage – a lot going on this month and this year! Our branch endeavors in January and February went right along with these topics – voter registration at UHMC (48 new voters registered on paper and several online) and the showing of The Rise of the Wahine and the discussions lead by Carol Hogard and Gail Ainsworth that ensued regarding Title IX's impact on women's equity at our membership drive (about 25 attended and 2 joined). Unfortunately, our former guest speaker and discussion leader, Gail Ainsworth, passed away unexpectedly Friday a week ago. A memorial service will be held Monday, March 9, at 2:00 p.m. in the UH Maui College Library, 2nd floor. We were certainly lucky to have partaken of her knowledge when we did.

We have gained several new members in the last few weeks, so take notice of the blue ribbons on their name tags at the next Speaker Meeting and say “Aloha.” If you have a friend or acquaintance that you think might be interested in joining, we offer ½ off national, state, and local branch dues from March 16 to June 30 for all new members who join at a Shape the Future Campaign event. That amounts to \$29.50 for national, \$5 for state, and \$8 for branch dues – a total of \$42.50, which carries them through June 30, 2021.



### ***Daughter of Moloka'i: A Novel*, by Alan Brennert**

*Daughter of Moloka'i* expands upon Ruth and Rachel's 22 year relationship, only hinted at in *Moloka'i*. It's a richly emotional tale of two women -- different in some ways, similar in others -- who never expected to meet, much less come to love one another. And for Ruth it is a story of discovery, the unfolding of a past she knew nothing about. Told in vivid, evocative prose that conjures up the beauty and history of both Hawaiian and Japanese cultures, it's the powerful and poignant tale that readers of *Moloka'i* have been awaiting for 15 years.

**April Book Selection - *Educated: A Memoir*, by Tara Westover.** *An unforgettable memoir about a young girl who, kept out of school, leaves her survivalist family and goes on to earn a PhD from Cambridge University. Born to survivalists in the mountains of Idaho, Tara Westover was seventeen the first time she set foot in a classroom. Her family was so isolated from mainstream society that there was no one to ensure that the children received an education, and no one to intervene when one of Tara's older brothers became violent. When another brother got himself into college, Tara decided to try a new kind of life. Her quest for knowledge transformed her, taking her over oceans and across continents, to Harvard and to Cambridge University.*


