IN SUPPORT OF THE NATIONAL WOMEN'S HISTORY MUSEUM www.nwhm.org

The National Women's History Museum is a not for profit organization working toward building a museum in Washington, D.C. dedicated to the history of women. The organization already has an on-line presence with a substantial amount of information and a mobile history museum. It has launched a 5-year initiative on Suffrage leading up to the 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment in 2020.

Suffragette a movie about the British militant suffragists is available in the public library system (some of you may remember Shoulder to Shoulder on PBS in the 1990s). Meryl Streep plays Emmeline Pankhurst who led the militant Women's Social and Political Union from 1903 to 1917. Pankhurst came to the U.S. in the 1910s and influenced some of the American movement leaders including Alice Paul and Lucy Burns. Paul and Burns formed the National Women's Party in 1917 to take a more activist role in the suffrage movement. The National American Woman Suffrage Association condemned their actions and kept working on suffrage by lobbying and publishing articles about suffrage. Ultimately, the efforts of both groups and the recognition of the war efforts of women brought about the vote for U.S. women. Equal suffrage passed in Britain in 1928.

We should always remember that the right to vote was not given to women; women fought for it.

Equal Pay Day is the symbolic date women must work to in order to equal the salary made by men in the previous year in the same jobs. This year it falls on April 12.

We have our own equal pay day issue on Maui.

Those of you who attended the March 26th presentation by Karin Phaneuf will have heard detailed information about how Maui County has for so long paid its administrative assistant staff much less than it pays its laborers. Currently it is \$736.00 per month less!

We are issuing a Call To Action for each of you to write to the County Council Member representing your district to urge her or him to correct this pay inequity. Emails or letters do not have to be detailed – they know what the disparate salaries are and the issue of unfair pay has been discussed in hearings for years. Council members respond to the numbers of constituent letters they receive.

We wrote to the Mayor and the Budget and Finance Committee Chair and to the employees union last May and received no response. In support of women and working families of Maui County, let's all write during the month of April and once again when we are notified that the amendment vote has been scheduled with the Budget and Finance Committee.




