Spring sprung, and Fall will be felled soon. We are ready!

Virginia Shaw, our new **Vice-President for Programs**, has been busy, and we have a great line-up of speakers for the next few months. To kick off the year, our September speaker will be Isla Young from the Maui Economic Development Board. (See the Speaker Meeting information on page 5 of this Newsletter for more details.)

Pat Gotschalk, our new **Financial Officer**, in consultation with Karen Grafe, has developed a very clear budget for this fiscal year, and she will be presenting it at the September meeting.

Rachel Miyoshi and the Whale Watch Fund Raiser Committee have been busy getting the Whale Watch set up for March 4, 2018.

The Board has met twice - on July 16 and on August 20 - and the calendar is prepared for this year. We still need an AAUW Funds Chair (handles Mystery Gifts, Auction items, etc., at Speaker Meetings), and Committee Members for several committees. We welcome your participation, and we will ask for volunteers at the September meeting!

Plus, our **AAUW Maui Branch Survey** through Survey Monkey was quite successful - 29 of 51 active members responded!

The collected data supported our current structure for Program/Speaker Meetings - of those reporting,

- 63% were highly satisfied with the meeting on the 4th Saturday morning of the month, and 33% were somewhat satisfied
- 56% were highly satisfied with meeting at the same location, and 30% were somewhat satisfied
- 37% were highly satisfied with Moose's as the usual location, and 33% were somewhat satisfied

Comments/suggestions included - meetings on the West side periodically, which the Board is working on for March Madness week next year. Other comments related to food choices, noise, and parking difficulties at Moose's. Some members wanted more day and time changes, but the majority were satisfied with what we are doing.

The collected data also support our current Interest Group structure.

For the **Book Club**, 18 people responded - 13 said that the 1st Saturday at noon works for them, and 16 said that they would not rather meet at a different time on Saturdays. In the follow-up **Other Interest Groups** questions, no one was highly interested in another Book Club at a different day and time, and 14 reported no interest in another Book Club.

For the Lunch Bunch, 24 to 25 people responded.

- Lunch Bunch 2nd Tuesday of the month 14 were highly satisfied with the current Lunch Bunch date, 8 were somewhat satisfied, and 3 were not satisfied at all.
- Current Lunch Bunch time 16 were highly satisfied, and 8 were somewhat satisfied.
- Selection of restaurants and locations 13 were highly satisfied, 7 were somewhat satisfied, 3 were slightly satisfied, and 1 was not satisfied at all.
- Comments varied some wanted more local food and fewer chain restaurants, some wanted cheaper venues, some wanted different day and time, and some gave high praise to Sara and her committee!

The final topic dealt with developing more **Interest Groups**, and the results were quite mixed. Overall, it appears that we are happy with what we have, and that we might consider some ideas. We aggregated the data for the various topics as for and against - with "for" defined as highly interested or somewhat interested, and "against" defined as slightly interested or not interested at all.



Topic: U.S. Foreign Policy and Petroleum. All Opinions are welcome.

What is the effect of U.S. petroleum security on foreign policy? For 45 years, the country has alternated between periods of energy security and insecurity, sometimes able to wield petroleum as a useful instrument of foreign policy, sometimes not. Despite the so-called "energy revolution," the U.S. today is by no means disentangled from foreign dependence and global trends. In order to be successful, policymakers must recognize both petroleum security circumstances and patterns in the relationship between petroleum and foreign policy.

Topic: STEM Education & Workforce Development in Hawaii

Speaker: Isla Young

Biographical Information: Isla Young is the Director of the K-12 STEM Education and workforce development programs for MEDB's Women In Technology. Created by the Maui Economic Development Board (MEDB), this state-wide project works in partnership with businesses and educators to inspire, educate and motivate girls, women and minorities toward STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) related careers.

Isla provides the leadership to develop the statewide project and place based, interdisciplinary learning programs reaching over 50,000 students and teachers in K-12 STEM education. Isla builds partnerships and collaborates with local and national leaders in technology and industry, institutions of higher education, and STEM-centered professional organizations. She serves on the Board of the Hawaii Geographic Information Coordinating Council (HIGICC), Board member of Pacific Center for Advanced Technical Training (PCATT), Board member of the Hawaii Science Teachers Association (HaSTA), and serves on the Board of the Patsy T. Mink Center for Business & Leadership – MCBL.
