Thoughts on the 19th Amendment

From the August 3, 2020 Christian Science Monitor:

We tend to envision the American woman suffrage movement as a triumphant newsreel of women in white dresses and fabulous hats marching to victory, as enlightened men suddenly and nobly hand the ballot to female citizens – all female citizens. That newsreel is romantic fiction.

The truth is grittier, and more important: It required three generations of fearless activists over a span of more than seven decades working in more than 900 state, local, and national campaigns to finally win the vote for American women. And that active verb – win – is important: Women were not given the vote; they were not granted the vote. As one commentator so aptly describes it: "They took it."

The fight for woman suffrage is one of the defining civil rights struggles in our nation's history – one that cuts to the heart of what democracy means: Who gets to participate in government? Who has a voice? When we say "We the People" do we really mean everyone? Of course, we are asking those same questions today, as voting rights, citizenship rights, and women's rights are still burning issues.

Speaker Meeting September 26

The August Speaker Meeting will be held on **Saturday, September 26, via Zoom. There will be a social half-hour starting at 10 a.m., then the business meeting at 10:30 a.m. followed by our speaker.** The Zoom log-in information will be emailed to members by Communications Director Sandi Boll prior to the meeting.

Our speaker will be **Barry Solomon**, professor emeritus of geography and environmental policy at Michigan Technological University. He will be presenting on the Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act, H.R. 763. This bill, introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives on January 24, 2019, would be a boon to renewable energy production and use, already important in Hawaii and on Maui. Dr. Solomon will explain how this bill provides for an annual dividend refund to most American households. He will also give an update on the status of a similar bill that passed one house of the Hawaii State legislature earlier this year, and the work of the Citizens Climate Lobby and its Maui Chapter, a non-partisan group that is fighting for these bills as a way to most effectively address climate change.


Book Group September 12

The book for September will be *The Goldfinch: A Novel*, by **Donna Tartt.**

Theo Decker, a 13 year-old New Yorker, miraculously survives an accident that kills his mother. Abandoned by his father, Theo is taken in by the family of a wealthy friend. Bewildered by his strange new home on Park Avenue, disturbed by schoolmates who don't know how to talk to him, and tormented above all by a longing for his mother, he clings to the one thing that reminds him of her: a small, mysteriously captivating painting that ultimately draws Theo into a wealthy and insular art community. As an adult, Theo moves between the drawing rooms of the rich and the dusty labyrinth of an antiques store where he works. He is at the center of a narrowing, ever more dangerous circle.



The book for October is Stay With Me, by Ayobami Adebayo

Yejide and Akin have been married since they met and fell in love at university. Though many expected Akin to take several wives, he and Yejide have always agreed: polygamy is not for them. But four years into their marriage—after consulting fertility doctors and healers, trying strange teas and unlikely cures—Yejide is still not pregnant. She assumes she still has time—until her family arrives on her doorstep with a young woman they introduce as Akin's second wife. Furious, shocked, and livid with jealousy, Yejide knows the only way to save her marriage is to get pregnant. Which, finally, she does—but at a cost far greater than she could have dared to imagine. An electrifying novel of enormous emotional power, Stay With Me asks how much we can sacrifice for the sake of family.

In a recent email to our branch, Jocelyn Romero Demirbag, UH Foundation Director of Development shared how Chancellor Hokana has gradually opened the campus, including the details of the establishment and practice of strict COVID-related protocols for students, staff and visitors. COVID testing is administered at the college Health Clinic for the members of the college community.

She outlined some new programs happening on campus, including COVID testing within the unsheltered homeless population, ocean water quality testing pre- and post-pandemic, the growing and distribution of food on campus addressing food insecurity, planning for a sustainable Maui and responding to Maui's need for a re-trained workforce. Coming soon will be registration information for attending virtual talks about these programs. You may remember Jocelyn was a speaker at one of our branch meetings.

She wrote, "We are looking forward to connecting. With your help we had over \$330,000 available for student scholarships this year. Seventy percent of our students are typically employed while they go to school. As most of our students' jobs have been affected by COVID, the difference you make now is more powerful than ever. Mahalo for making that difference in our community."
