• Many AAUW Maui members joined the **National Women's March** on Saturday, Jan. 20th. Wearing our Maui Branch T-shirts, we carried signs in support of women's equality. We were part of an energetic crowd of over 2000 at UH/MC. This year's theme was civic engagement, and included promoting participation in the 2018 midterm elections, increasing the number of women who run for office, and getting out the vote by registering voters. On the AAUW National website (aauw.org) is a wealth of information about issues of vital importance to women, with the rationales and research data explaining policies supported by AAUW.



TOPIC: Clearing the Path: Creating Women's Educational Opportunities & Property Rights; From Title IX to Building the First High School for Girls in the USA; From Patsy Mink & Bella Abzug (1970's) back to Sarah & Margaret Fell (1670's).

AAUW Maui Member **Carol Hogard** was co-founder of the Women's Studies Program at Minneapolis Community and Technical College in 1973. It was one of the first Women's Studies Programs in the upper mid-west. She taught in that program for 41 years.
