The book for March is *The Lost Art of Mixing: The School of Essential Ingredients,* by Erica Bauermeister.

Lillian and her restaurant have a way of drawing people together. There's Al, the accountant who finds meaning in numbers; Chloe, a budding chef who hasn't learned to trust after heartbreak; Finnegan, quiet and steady as a tree, who can disappear into the background despite his massive height; Louise, Al's wife, whose anger simmers just below the boiling point; and Isabelle, whose memories are slowly slipping from her grasp. And there's Lillian herself, whose life has taken a turn she didn't expect...Their lives collide and mix with

those around them, creating a family that is chosen, not given. A beautifully imagined novel about the ties that bind—and links that break—*The Lost Art of Mixing* is a captivating meditation on the power of love, food, and companionship.

The book for April is *The Three-Year Swim Club: The Untold Story of Maui's Sugar Ditch Kids and Their Quest For Olympic Glory,* by Julie Checkoway. This is the tale of impoverished sugar plantation children on Maui who were challenged by an elementary teacher to swim literally and figuratively against the current of their circumstances and to become Olympic champions.

Speaker Meeting March 27

The March Speaker Meeting will be held on **Saturday, March 27, via Zoom. There will be** a social half-hour starting at 10 a.m., then the business meeting at 10:30 a.m. followed by our speaker. The Zoom log-in information will be emailed to members by Communications Director Sandi Boll prior to the meeting.

Our speaker will be **Alison K. Hoagland,** who will be "zooming in" from Washington, D.C. Professor Hoagland is the author of numerous books which explore community life in small industrial towns. She will give an illustrated presentation titled "The Boardinghouse Murders: Death and Life in a Michigan Mining Town, 1913." The presentation will examine the life of a Croatian immigrant family in a copper-mining town near Lake Superior. During a strike, deputies shot and killed two miners in the family's company house. The resulting publicity and documentation permit unusual insight into otherwise-ordinary



lives. Professor Hoagland is a Professor Emerita, Michigan Technological University. She received degrees from Brown University and George Washington University and specializes in the history of American vernacular architecture.
