

The book for April is *The Three-Year Swim Club: The Untold Story of Maui's Sugar Ditch Kids and Their Quest For Olympic Glory*, by Julie Checkoway. This is the tale of impoverished sugar plantation children on Maui who were challenged by an elementary school teacher to swim literally and figuratively against the current of their circumstances and to become Olympic champions.

The book for June is The Immortalists, by Chloe Benjamin.

If you knew the date of your death, how would you live your life? It's 1969 in New York City's Lower East Side, and word has spread of the arrival of a mystical woman, a traveling psychic who claims to be able to tell anyone the day they will die. The Gold children sneak out to hear their fortunes. The prophecies inform the next five decades. The Immortalists probes the line between destiny and choice, reality and illusion, this world and the next. It is a deeply moving testament to the power of story, the nature of belief, and the unrelenting pull of familial bonds.




