President's Message

We welcomed 20 members attending our Speaker Meeting on August 28 on Zoom, and enjoyed an informative talk by Dr. Sheri Daniels on *The Resilience of Success: Weaving and Integrating Hawaiian Values into Health.* Many thanks to Virginia Shaw for continuing to provide excellent speakers for our meetings.



All members are invited to join the September 12 Board Meeting via Zoom.

This is a good opportunity for newer members to learn more about the Maui branch and its ongoing goals and projects. A Zoom link will be emailed to our membership prior to the meeting.

I'm happy to report that Branch and State projects made some excellent progress in August: Joyce Yamada reported that Chancellor Hokoana is pleased to establish UHMC as a partner college with our Branch. This will enhance opportunities to host joint UHMC/AAUW events (such as films and educational programs) and also to create an AAUW Student Organization. We welcome as a new member Shawna Pabingwit, the incoming Title IX Coordinator for Students at UHMC. Also, the State AAUW Title IX legislation project is moving forward on schedule. Moderators and notetakers from the Maui Branch and other branches trained to conduct student focus groups that will be held in September. We will keep you posted on this important effort.

The current plan is for the Maui branch to forge ahead with the November 7 Chocolate Experience fundraiser in Lahaina, which is an outdoor event, described in more detail on page 5 in this newsletter. We will discuss the prospects for our annual Whale Watch fundraiser at the September 12 board meeting.

During the Speaker Meeting we were able to conduct some business, including a motion that the Branch limit in-person activities to vaccinated members. This motion was presented because the COVID-19 Delta numbers on Maui continue to remain high, and passed by majority vote. As we schedule events we will keep this new rule in mind, as well as the CDC and State/County guidance on safe gatherings.

This is the recent guidance from AAUW National on AAUW Gatherings: Put Safety First

Many members are understandably eager to return to in-person affiliate gatherings. However, due to the recent rise in the COVID-19 delta variant, we strongly advise caution. It's critical to follow all city, state and county guidance and be mindful of the risks. The pandemic isn't over, and many of us regularly engage with young people and others who may be unvaccinated. It's also worth remembering that virtual gatherings can help enable diversity and inclusion by allowing you to expand your reach to new groups.

In principle and practice, AAUW values and seeks a diverse membership. There shall be no barriers to full participation in this organization on the basis of gender, race, creed, age, sexual orientation, national origin, disability or class.

SUBJECT Items C-1, 2, and 3 on CRC Agenda for September 2, 2021

Aloha Chair Sarich and Commissioners:

It has become evident that the County's procedures and standards for the renaming of County-owned parks and facilities has resulted in an obvious bias in favor of male honorees. The attached list shows fifteen County facilities and parks currently named for men, and only two named for women.

This unfair imbalance does not do justice to the many Maui women leaders, coaches, volunteers and noteworthy citizens whose civic contributions have inspired and enhanced our Island.

The current ordinances, policies and standards must be reviewed and improved, to better reflect the positive impact and enduring example that Maui's amazing women have demonstrated. Girls, as well as boys, need to know their role models!

I ask you to please defer action on the three agenda items -- C-1, 2 and 3 - to ensure a comprehensive review and improvement of the ordinances, policies and standards for renaming County parks and facilities, to ensure unbiased representation of honorees. Please urge County officials, administration and County Council to correct the imbalance, and establish a balanced and accurate renaming procedure.
