The Board formulates policy and exercises control over the university through its executive officer, the university president, and has exclusive jurisdiction over the internal structure, management, and operation of the UH system.

# **<u>Diversity and Inclusion</u>** The Life of Princess Victoria Kühio Kinoiki (Kinoike) Kekaulike II Pīʻikoi



#### 1909 – Princess Kinoike

Princess Victoria Kinoiki Kekaulike Pīʻikoi (also spelled Kinoike) was the Govenor of Hawaiʻi island from 1880 until her death in 1884. The Princess was also known as Mary. Princess Kinoike married David Kahalepouli Piʻikoi on February 25, 1861. They had three sons, David Kawānakoa, Edward Keliʻiahonui, and Jonah Kūhiō Kalanianaʻole. Her youngest son, Prince Kūhiō served a year in Oahu Prison in the counter-revolution in 1895 against the illegal overthrow of the government of Queen Liliuokalani in 1893. Prince Kūhiō later served as a Delegate in the U.S. House of Representatives from the Territory of Hawaiʻi. He advocated for the people of Hawaiʻi, especially the native Hawaiians. Prince Kūhiō is acknowledged for his advocacy in the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act of 1920.

Princess Kinoike was born on May 12, 1843. Her parents were High Chief Kūhiō Kalanianaʻole of Hilo, and Princess Kinoiki Kekaulike from Kauaʻi island. Princess Kinoikeʻs mother, Princess Kinoike Kekaulike was the daughter of King Kaumualiʻi (1778-1824) of Kauaʻi and her mother was the stepdaughter of the Queen Regent Kaʻahumanu and the daughter of Kaumualiʻi. Princess Victoriaʻs mother was named Kaʻapuwai Kapuaʻamohi, daughter of Queen Kawalu. Princess Kinoikeʻs siblings, Queen Kapiʻolani, and Poʻomaikelani were both members of King Kalākauaʻs court in 1883. Queen Kapiʻolani married King Kalākaua.

In 1874, King Kalākaua granted Kinoike the title of Princess with the prestige of Her Royal Highness. Her sons followed suit and became known as Princes with the prestige of His Royal Highnesses. In Kalākaua's coronation Princess Kinoike graciously carried the royal feather cape of King Kamehameha and presented it to Chief Justice Albert Francis Judd who then ceremoniously placed it on Kalākaua's shoulders. On October 18, 1878 Princess Kinoike became widowed.

In 1883, the original repaired bronze statue of King Kamehameha arrived in Kohala. Princess Kinoike had suggested that it be placed in Kohala. The original statue which

sailed from Italy on the ship G.F. Haendel, had sunk off the Falkland Islands. It was later salvaged and needed minor repairs. A Captain who bought the statue then brought it to the islands and resold it to Kalākaua for a profit. In the meantime a replica of the statue had been made which would later remain in Honolulu. It was Princess Kinoike's recommendation that secured the placement of the original eight-and-a-half foot bronze statue representing King Kamehameha at age forty-five years in Kohala. The statue was unveiled on May 8, 1883 in Kapa'au in front of the North Kohala Civic Center near Kamehameha's birthplace. King Kalakaua and his entourage of Russian officers, one hundred guardsmen, government officials, royalty and the Royal Hawaiian Band traveled with him on the Russian warship into Māhukona. It was a splendid site to witness with an impressive royal salute that fired from the warship (Harrington 2020:77).

On January 8, 1884 Princess Kinoike died at her Ululani residence of what was presumed heart disease. Princess Kinoike donated her Beretania street residence Ululani, with the intentions of helping Hawaiian mothers with a proposed maternity home. This site later became the Kapiolani Medical Center for Women and Children. Upon her death two of her sons were adopted by Queen Kapi'olani. Her sister Po'omaikelani adopted her middle son. Princess Victoria Kinoike Kekaulike will be remembered for her generosity and kindness to her beloved people and the legacy of donating her land for the medical care of the Hawaiian people.
