## Moʻolelo ʻo Mōʻī wahine mma Emma

Beautiful Queen Emma Kalanikaumaka'amano Kaleleonālani Na'ea Rooke's tenure as Queen of Hawai'i was from 1856 through November 30, 1863. Mō'ī wahine was the daughter of High Chief George Na'ea and High



Chiefess Fanny Kekelaokalani Young.Mō'ī wahine Emma was married to the King of Hawai'i, Alexander Liholiho, Kamehameha IV on June 19, 1856. They had one child, Prince Albert' who died on August 27, 1862 of a respiratory illness. Queen Emma died on April 25, 1885.

Mō'ī wahine Emma's many accomplishments in her lifetime may be summarized in this brief mo'olelo as a kind, compassionate Queen who deeply cared about the health and well being of her people and their religious education. She expanded the palace library and represented the palace affairs with dignity and grace of a talented musician, vocalist, pianist, and dancer who was also a skilled equestrian.Queen Emma traveled to Europe and the United States between the years of 1865 through 1866. She met with European royalty, Anglican clergy, American President Andrew Johnson, and Indian delegations of Chickasaw and Cherokee.

**Mo'olelo (cont.)** State dinners were held in her honor and she was the first "Queen" to visit the White House. Queen Emma and Queen Victoria became close friends.

In October of 1862, Queen Emma and King Lunalilo were baptized in the Anglican Church and confirmed in November, 1862. Queen Emma founded St. Andrew's Cathedral. Queen Emma also founded St. Andrew's Priory for Girls in 1867. She was instrumental in establishing the need for an Episcopal secondary school for boys which later became known as 'Iolani School in memory of her husband. In Hawai'i, the Feast of the Holy Sovereigns recognizes and honors Kamehameha IV and Queen Emma on November 28 in the Episcopal Church. After King Lunalilo's death, in 1874, Queen Emma ran unsuccessfully against David Kālakaua for the throne. However, her followers remained steadfast and loyal to her. Queen Emma will always be remember for her humanitarianism in her establishment of the Queen's Hospital founded in 1859. She was deeply concerned as native Hawaiians were dying massively from the foreign introduced diseases like smallpox.

In summary, Queen Emma will be remembered for a legacy of caring for the physical and spiritual health of her people while providing equal opportunity in education, religion and medical access. On October 7, 2023 the Daughters of Hawai'i will honor Queen Emma at her Summer Palace, Hānaiakamalama in Nu'uanu and all are invited. As a member of Daughters of Hawai'i, Queen Emma is fondly cherished.
