## The Jewish and Muslim History in the Hawaiian Kingdom Written by Dr. Charmaine Kinoike Bissen

Foreigners' fascination with the beauty and allure of the Hawaiian Kingdom brought many interesting notable figures into Hawaiian History.

The Hawaiian monarchs accepted different ethnic groups and religions into their Kingdom freely. In 1798, a sailor on the whaling ship Neptune recorded in the ship's log that, "the Hawaiian king had come aboard and brought a "Jew cook" with him" (https://www.shaloha.com/). During the period of 1850-1900 the arrival of Jews from California and other countries increased as they became suppliers to sugar plantations. In 1865, in a Jewish newspaper in Germany printed an interesting article on the first report of the islands. Paul Neumann who emigrated from San Francisco became King Kālakaua's personal attorney. Prior to December 1886, Elias Abraham Rosenberg arrived and became well acquainted with King Kalākaua who ruled from 1874 to 1891. Rosenberg presented Kalākaua with a sefer Torah and a silver Yad (pointer). Kalākaua gave Rosenberg a gold medal, silver cup, and \$260.00. Rosenberg had a colorful history with the King. The King gave Rosenberg the title kahuna kilokilo (royal soothsayer) (https://en.wikipedia.org/). There were many other Jewish merchants and advisors who also played a significant role in Hawaiian history. There is extensive literature on the Jewish contributions in Hawaiian history. Today there are about 10,000 Jews living in Hawai'i.

As Hawai'i became more noticeable in world affairs, the arrival of Muslim immigrants in the early 1900s added to the diverse religious cultures of Hawai'i. The immigrants were mainly from South Asia and the Middle East. The early Muslim settlers were traders and laborers who migrated for economic reasons. They integrated into the local culture while maintaining a low profile.

(https://medium.com/@americanmuslimhistory). The first mosque, known as the Manoa mosque, was established in 1972 on Oahu. Today, there are about 5,000 Muslims living in Hawai'i.

In May of 2009, the Hawai'i State Senate approved a bill to celebrate "Islam Day on September 24 every year." The bill recognizes "the rich religious, scientific, cultural and artistic contributions" that Islam and the Islamic world have made. (https://www.arabnews.com/islam).

In summary, there is much more to appreciate about the Jews and Muslims who have chosen to make Hawai'i their homes. Their valuable contributions bring people

together as an integral part of Hawaii's social fabric.
